

Communion Wafer

Question: Do Catholics always need to receive communion in wafer form, or can it be different kinds of bread?

Answer: In the Roman Rite of the Catholic Church, the most common form for the Eucharistic bread is the small white communion "wafer" that is a ubiquitous part of the Catholic Mass. The instructions of the Church have been very specific regarding the make-up of the bread used in the Mass: "The bread used in the celebration of the Most Holy Eucharistic Sacrifice must be unleavened, purely of wheat, and recently made ... it follows therefore that bread made from another substance, even if it is grain, or if it is mixed with another substance different from wheat to such an extent that it would not commonly be considered wheat bread, does not constitute valid matter for confecting the Sacrifice and the Eucharistic Sacrament" (see Redemptionis Sacramentum by the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments, no. 48). The Church's tradition of using a wheat-based bread is based on the bread that Jesus would have used at the Last Supper and is considered to be an essential part of the "matter" of the Sacrament of the Eucharist.

As we consider the question of whether a "wafer" — which is properly called a "host" — should be used, we also must keep in mind that in the Eastern Rites of the Catholic Church, leavened (i.e. "raised") bread is more often used. And so, while the thin, white "wafer" is most commonly used in the Roman Rite of the Church, the full expression of the Catholic tradition does allow for a more substantial form of bread to be used, but the tradition of using a simple wheat bread with no other additions or additives is considered essential.

Oblea de la Comunión

Pregunta:

¿Los católicos siempre necesitan recibir la comunión en forma de oblea, o pueden ser diferentes tipos de pan?

Respuesta:

En el Rito Romano de la Iglesia Católica, la forma más común para el pan eucarístico es la pequeña "oblea" de comunión blanca que es una parte omnipresente de la Misa Católica. Las instrucciones de la Iglesia han sido muy específicas con respecto a la composición del pan utilizado en la Misa: "El pan utilizado en la celebración del Santísimo Sacrificio Eucarístico debe ser sin levadura, puramente de trigo, y recientemente hecho ... se deduce, pues, que el pan hecho de otra sustancia, aunque sea de grano, o si se mezcla con otra sustancia diferente del, no constituye una cuestión válida para confeccionar el Sacrificio y el Sacramento Eucarístico" (véase Redemptionis Sacramentum de la Congregación para el Culto Divino y la Disciplina de los Sacramentos, n. 48).

La tradición de la Iglesia de usar un pan a base de trigo se basa en el pan que Jesús habría usado en la Última Cena y se considera una parte esencial de la "materia" del Sacramento de la Eucaristía.

Al considerar la cuestión de si se debe usar una "oblea", que propiamente se llama "anfitrión", también debemos tener en cuenta que en los ritos orientales de la Iglesia católica, el pan con levadura (es decir, "criado") se usa con más frecuencia. Y así, mientras que el delgado, blanco "oblea" es más comúnmente utilizado en el rito romano de la Iglesia, la plena expresión de la tradición católica permite una forma más sustancial de pan que se utilizará, pero la tradición de utilizar un pan de trigo simple sin otras adiciones o aditivos se considera esencial.

THE CONVERSION OF

St. Paul the Apostle was the greatest of the early Christian missionaries. He first appears in the Acts of the Apostles under the name of Saul, who was raised in the Jewish faith as a Pharisee trained in the strict observance of God's Law. He believed the Law should be obeyed by himself and all Jews, and was upset by the early Christian Church, believing the early Christians had broken away from their Jewish traditions. He actively persecuted the Church in Jerusalem. As the first Christian martyr Stephen was being stoned to death, Saul watched the cloaks of the persecutors (Acts 7:58).

Paul traveled to Damascus to further persecute early Christians. On the road to Damascus Saul had an encounter with the Risen Jesus Christ (Acts of the Apostles 9:1–19, Galatians 1: 13–14). Jesus asked, "Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?" Paul replied, "Who are you, sir?" Jesus responded, "I am Jesus whom you are persecuting" (Acts 9: 4 – 5). Jesus then sent Saul into Damascus to wait for further instructions. Saul was shaken and blinded by the experience. When a Christian named Ananias came and baptized Saul, his blindness went away. As a result of this encounter Saul became a follower of Christ. He was now convinced that fellowship with the risen Jesus Christ, not the observance of the Law, was all that was needed to receive God's promise of salvation. (Galatians 1:11–12; 3:1–5) Saul, whose name now became Paul, went to Jerusalem to consult with Peter (Galatians 1: 18).

After his first missionary journeys, Paul was called by Jesus to proclaim the Gospel to the Gentiles. He spent the rest of his life journeying on his missions, establishing local churches, and writing to them when he heard of their accomplishments and failures. Paul's letters are the earliest records of the life and history of the early Church. As inspired by the Holy Spirit Paul's letters are part of the Canon of the New Testament. As a record of the happenings in the early Church they are in invaluable record of the expansion of the Christianity.

The Five Precepts of the Church

The precepts of the Church are part of a moral life rooted in and nourished by the Eucharist. The Church understands these 5 precepts to identify someone as minimally Catholic.

1st Precept: To attend Mass on Sundays and holy days of obligation. 2nd Precept: To go to confession at least once a year.

3rd Precept: To receive Holy Communion at least during Easter season. 4th Precept: To observe days of fasting and abstinence especially during Lent. 5th Precept: Providing for the needs of the Church through financial giving and charitable acts.

Pope's Prayer Intention for January: At the Service of Human Fraternity (released Tuesday, 5 January 2021)

The Pope Video (thepopevideo.org) for January, the first of 2021, was released on Tuesday with the prayer intention that Pope Francis is entrusting to the entire Catholic Church through the Pope's Worldwide Prayer Network (which includes the Eucharistic Youth Movement – EYM). The message chosen to open the year 2021 is dedicated to human fraternity: in response to all the challenges facing humanity, the Holy Father asks that we open ourselves to each other and unite, as human beings and as brothers and sisters, "with those who pray according to other cultures, other traditions and other beliefs." As he has said on other occasions, "There is no alternative: we will either build the future together or there will not be a future. Religions, in particular, cannot renounce the urgent task of building bridges between peoples and cultures."

Sons and daughters of the same Father: The path towards fraternity proposed by The Pope Video starts with openness "to the Father of all," and with seeing "in the other a brother or sister." He had already advanced this idea in his latest encyclical, *Fratelli tutti*: "We are certain that 'only with this awareness that we are not orphans, but children, can we live in peace with one another." For the Pope, the differences among people who profess different religions or who live according to other traditions should not impede achieving a culture of encounter, since after all, "we are brothers and sisters who pray."

The essential of our faith: In the pursuit of this spirit of fraternity, the Pope also reminds us not to forget that, for Christians, "the wellspring of human dignity and fraternity is in the Gospel of Jesus Christ." In this sense, he asks believers to return to what is essential to our faith: "the adoration of God and love of neighbor." In dialogue with other religions, as the Pope also explains in *Fratelli tutti*, this becomes fundamental, since while others may drink from other sources, "for us Christians, the wellspring of human dignity and fraternity is in the Gospel of Jesus Christ."

January 2021 Prayer Intention:

"When we pray to God following Jesus, we come together as brothers and sisters with those who pray according to other cultures, other traditions and other beliefs. We are brothers and sisters who pray. Fraternity leads us to open ourselves to the Father of all and to see in the other a brother or sister, to share our lives or to support, to love, and to know each other. The Church values God's action in other religions, without forgetting that for us Christians, the wellspring of human dignity and fraternity, is in the Gospel of Jesus Christ. We believers must return to our sources and concentrate on what is essential. What is essential to our faith is the adoration of God and love of neighbor. Let us pray that the Lord may give us the grace to live in full fellowship with our brothers and sisters of other religions and not fight each other, and praying for one another, open ourselves to all."
